Guidance

Statement of purpose

The College of Radiographers is aware of the financial challenges that can stand in the way of some who aspire to train as therapeutic radiographers limiting their individual potential and affecting their career opportunities.

Specifically, there are concerns that the difficulties of having to give up paid employment as a support worker in radiotherapy / cancer services to attend a degree programme can provide an insurmountable barrier to career progression. Similarly, those wishing to commence a radiography degree programme as a

second degree often face difficulties because of existing financial commitments and/or circumstances preventing them from accessing educational opportunities.

The College has been able, due to a generous legacy, to establish a programme that supports individuals to study and graduate in pre-registration therapeutic radiography in England and Wales.

This discretionary bursary award provides an opportunity to widen participation and further the College's diversity, equality and inclusion strategy. We are offering up to five therapeutic radiography bursaries each year. We are aiming to support individuals who would otherwise not be able to access educational opportunity to further their career in therapeutic radiography by completing a programme of undergraduate or postgraduate pre-registration study leading to an honours degree in therapeutic radiography.

On completion, graduates must be eligible to apply for registration with the HCPC so that they may work in the UK as a therapeutic radiographer.

Objectives

- To establish a programme for attracting and awarding bursaries to up to five new applicants every year.
- To facilitate the College's commitment to promoting equality, diversity and inclusion and help to address barriers to further education, increase career opportunities and enable career progression.
- To provide funding support to support workers and those intending to study therapeutic radiography
 as a second degree to facilitate undergraduate or postgraduate pre-registration education and
 training in therapeutic radiography.
- To provide an open, fair and equitable evaluation process.
- To increase the therapeutic radiographer workforce to improve patient care.
- To align the programme with the College's values of equality, integrity and advocacy.

Equality, diversity and inclusion statement

The College is committed to encouraging applications from, and respecting, all people regardless of race, ethnic origin, age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage, civil partnership, pregnancy, maternity, paternity, religion, belief, sex or sexual orientation. In addition, we hope these bursary awards will form part of our work in addressing social, economic, and systemic barriers which affect access to educational opportunities and professional development within radiography.

As part of this commitment, the College will aim to:

- Promote the bursary as widely as possible to increase its reach to currently under-represented groups and communities in therapeutic radiography;
- Guard against making assumptions and acting on harmful stereotypes about the characteristics of individuals; and
- Make reasonable adjustments for disabled applicants.

Policy

The College will seek applications for bursary-style funding support from eligible individuals seeking to enrol on a programme of undergraduate or postgraduate pre-registration study leading to an honours degree in therapeutic radiography.

Funding is restricted to applicants who are residing in England or Wales and applying to higher education institutions in England or Wales, who are seeking to develop from a position as a support worker in radiotherapy / cancer services or who are seeking to commence therapeutic radiography education and training as a second degree.

Please find specific information about the different arrangements for England and Wales in appendices A and B.

Priority will be given to applications from individuals who, would not otherwise be able to join, or are experiencing financial barriers preventing them from accessing, the therapeutic radiography programme.

First-time applicants may apply for a bursary ahead of application to join the undergraduate or postgraduate pre-registration therapeutic radiography degree programme at a higher education institution approved by both the College and the HCPC.

An application will only be accepted from the individual intending to study therapeutic radiography themselves. Applications will not be accepted from other representatives (eg employer) on behalf of an individual.

The deadline for bursary application submission each year is 30 September. The deadline will be strictly observed.

Applications will be evaluated by a panel appointed by the College board of trustees. The assessment panel will comprise the Chair of the College board of trustees, a trustee with education responsibility, a trustee who is a therapeutic radiographer, a diversity champion and a senior member of staff. The assessment panel will present their recommendations to the College board of trustees for approval. The decision of the trustees in respect of any application is final. The award of a bursary and the value of the award are at the discretion of the College board of trustees.

Completed application forms will be anonymised before being seen by members of the assessment panel.

We will not be conducting any face-to-face interviews with applicants.

If the application is successful, candidates will be notified by email and sent a letter of confirmation. If the application is unsuccessful, candidates will be notified by email.

Bursaries made to first-time applicants will be conditional upon application and acceptance onto the programme.


Bursaries, once agreed, will be paid in each year of the therapeutic radiography programme, provided the applicant remains on the course. A bursary will be made in principle for the complete course (no more than three years in total), but access to funding after year one is dependent on successful completion of each academic year. For this reason, education provider confirmation verifying the recipient's fitness to continue into the next academic year will be required at the end of each academic year to secure support for the following year.

Eligibility and assessment criteria checklist


The bursary awards are open to individual applicants who meet the person eligibility criteria intending to enrol on a programme that meets the programme eligibility criteria. The panel will use the assessment criteria to rank applications and to make recommendations to the College board of trustees.

	PERSON ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA
$\overline{\mathbf{A}}$	For whom the course will be a second degree or is working as a support worker in radiotherapy / cancer services.
~	Has a right to work in the UK and is resident in England or Wales.
~	Is not following an apprenticeship route.
$\overline{\mathbf{A}}$	Is not receiving a student loan or other sponsorship to cover the course fees for the programme in which they are enrolled. (England only)
~	Can demonstrate that their circumstances prevent them from being able, without support, to join the course.
✓	Is aged 18 or over at the intended start date of the programme.
	PROGRAMME ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA
✓	Is an undergraduate or postgraduate pre-registration programme in therapeutic radiography at a named higher education institution in England or Wales.
~	Is approved by the College of Radiographers and the HCPC.
~	Is part-time or full-time.
	ASSESSMENT CRITERIA
*	Priority will be given to applications from individuals who, would not otherwise be able to afford to join a therapeutic radiography programme.
*	Does the applicant live in rented or temporary accommodation?
*	Does the applicant have any adults and/or children wholly or mainly financially dependent upon them?
*	If the applicant is an assistant practitioner, are they accredited by the College of Radiographers?
*	Does the applicant currently work in a support capacity in radiotherapy/cancer services?
*	Does the applicant have examples of recent and relevant education and/or training in radiotherapy/cancer services?

Appendix A - Arrangements in England

As programmes are currently fee-paying in England and non-fee-paying in Wales, different arrangements apply in each country. In England, bursaries are intended solely to cover the full fees for a therapeutic radiography programme. In addition, currently, students applying for pre-registration therapeutic radiography programmes can apply to the NHS Learning Support Fund for funding.

Appendix B - Arrangements in Wales

As programmes are currently fee-paying in England and non-fee-paying in Wales, different arrangements apply in each country. In Wales, bursaries are intended to cover some type of maintenance or educational support. The intention is that the bursary in Wales will balance the support those studying therapeutic radiography at English universities receive from the NHS Learning Support Fund. In Wales, there are no restrictions on how the recipient uses the bursary funds they receive from the College.

Appendix C - Supporting statement and reference requirements

You will be asked to upload three documents as part of your online application. So, you should prepare the following documents in advance of starting your online application:

SUPPORTING STATEMENT

Your supporting statement should cover the following points:

- Why do you want to undertake this study?
- Please describe how your circumstances prevent you from being able, without support, to undertake this study.
- What difference would this bursary make to your ability to complete this course?
- What difference would this bursary make to your life and career?
- Are you from a traditionally under-represented community/marginalized group? (optional)

(500-word limit. Format: Microsoft Word, PDF or JPG.)

TWO REFERENCES

Please supply two independent references (ie not family members). One should be from an academic referee and the second may be your employer or another independent referee.

Examples of academic referees in this context include: teachers; tutors / lecturers; professionals; practice educators or equivalent; or other providers of education / training. If you are unsure whether your referee would be considered an academic referee in this context, please contact bursary@sor.org.

Each referee's signed supporting statement should include:

- Applicant name;
- Referee name;
- Referee place of work;
- Referee job title;
- Referee address and contact details;
- How do you know the applicant?
- Why do you feel the applicant is a suitable candidate for the award?
- [For employer referees] How are you supporting the applicant in undertaking the therapeutic radiography programme if they are continuing to work while studying?
